



**NIH Public Access Compliance Policy
Loyola University Chicago Health Sciences Campus
April, 2008**

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) **Public Access Policy** became effective April 7, 2008. Under this federal law, NIH requires that the author's final version of any peer-reviewed journal article accepted for publication on or after April 7, 2008 and resulting from NIH-funded activities must be submitted to the PubMed Central (PMC) repository, where it will be made available to the public within 12 months after the journal article is published.

Under the NIH Public Access Policy, the grantee (Loyola University Chicago; LUC) makes a contractual promise to NIH that all published works containing NIH-funded activities will be submitted to NIH and that a Public Access License will be granted to NIH. In accordance, all Loyola University Chicago Health Sciences Campus (LUCHSC) authors publishing NIH-funded research must comply with the following:

Manuscript Submission and Copyright Guidelines

For peer-reviewed manuscripts containing NIH-funded activities that are accepted for publication on or after April 7, 2008, LUCHSC authors must comply with the NIH policy using one of two mechanisms:

- **Recommended Method: Self-Submission**

Upon acceptance for publication, LUCHSC authors may submit the final version of the manuscript and accompanying files to the NIH Manuscript Submission System (NIHMS) [<http://www.nihms.nih.gov/>]. Submission can be done by the author or a third party in their laboratory or department. The Health Sciences Library Reference Staff also offers submission assistance to LUCHSC authors [http://library.luhs.org/home_nih.html].

LUCHSC authors who are publishing NIH-funded research must also make sure that the copyright transfer or other publication agreement permits the submission of the manuscript to NIH. Thus, authors must inform the journal that the article is subject to the NIH Public Access Policy when submitting it for publication. Authors should formally request permission from the journal if they wish to deposit their article with PMC either (a) before the journal's normal release time (for PMC journals) or (b) if the journal does not normally make manuscripts available at PMC. The following language is provided as an example of that which an author or institution might add to a copyright agreement to insure that the article can be submitted for public access:

"[Journal] acknowledges that [Author] retains the right to provide a copy of the final manuscript to the NIH upon acceptance for publication, for public archiving in PubMed Central as soon as possible but no later than 12 months after publication by [Journal]."

- **Alternative Method: Reliance on the Publisher**

Some publishers will submit manuscripts to PMC for authors. A list of these publishers is available at http://publicaccess.nih.gov/submit_process_journals.htm. Some of these publishers are charging a fee for this submission service; however, it is NOT necessary to pay for this service. Authors can avoid paying the fee by using the NIHMS system (see Self-Submission above) or contacting the Health Sciences Library Reference Staff for assistance [http://library.luhs.org/home_nih.html].

If submitting a manuscript to one of the journals that submits manuscripts to PMC for authors, nothing further needs to be done to comply with copyright requirements.

Citing PubMed Central ID Numbers

Effective May 25, 2008, authors are required to cite the PMC ID or NIHMS ID numbers for any articles cited in progress reports, new applications, and renewals. These are only required for articles accepted for publication on or after April 7, 2008; however, authors may include PMC ID numbers for any articles in PubMed Central.
